Within the field of Japanese linguistics, few areas have generated as much controversy as the morpheme *wa*; traditionally described as a marker of old or contrasted information, its function as a discourse

This last section contains historical materials on the following topics: Colonial History; Western Themes; Relocation and Immigration; Women's History; The Black Experience; Justice and the Law; 19th Century Industrialization and Labor History; 20th Century; and War and Conflict. Appendixes contain a bibliography, reprints from the National Standards for United States History (Grades 5-12), and recommended resources for teachers and librarians of Grades 5-12. (BT)
